THE HOUSING CHOICE VOUCHER PROGRAM (SECTION 8) IS THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S MAJOR PROGRAM FOR ASSISTING VERY LOW-INCOME FAMILIES, THE ELDERLY, AND THE DISABLED TO AFFORD DECENT HOUSING IN THE PRIVATE MARKET.

- 370 families received rental assistance
- 642 individuals served
- 181 elderly citizens received rental assistance
- 287 disabled people received rental assistance
- 404 inspections conducted by certified staff
- 44 new rental vouchers issued

THE WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM REDUCES ENERGY COSTS FOR LOW-INCOME HOUSEHOLDS BY INCREASING THE ENERGY EFFICIENCY OF THEIR HOMES, WHILE ENSURING THEIR HEALTH AND SAFETY.

- \$12,500 spent per home, on average, to improve energy efficiency
- 54 homes weatherized
- 81 individuals served
- 18 homes rehabilitated (Healthy Homes)
- 112 Continuing Education hours completed by staff and contractors

Highlight: We expanded into Clark and Floyd counties, opened an office in New Albany, and provided benefits effectively and efficiently. We forged new partnerships with many wonderful, missionaligned organizations.


